From the Tournament Manager

The first tournament for 2017 was the Club Swiss Pairs held over two Wednesdays in early January. Thirty six pairs took part, some taking part in a Swiss Pair format for the first time and loving it and have requested for more such format events. The Tournament Committee will consider this (request) for 2018. Members are encouraged to let us know what new events or formats they would like to see for 2018, just pass your ideas to any Director or Management Committee member. For example this year we are having a Red Point event on a Monday night (in July) as requested by some members.

Back to the Swiss Pairs, the winners for 2017 were Hugh Alguire and David Gallagher.

Laurel Lander / Se-Moi Lee, Mary Johnston/Leon Ref were 2nd and 3rd respectively. The top restricted pair was Stephen Holyoake and David Henderson.

The Club Open Restricted Pairs (0 to 300MP) event was held on Sunday 5th February (a whole day event). Twenty two pairs took part with the top seven winners qualifying for the state finals which will be held on the 27th and 28th of May at the Nedlands Bridge Club. The top three in this event were, 1st Steven Pynt/Dave Sloan, 2nd Laurie Money/Richard Harris and 3rd Bhavna and Nilesh Patel.

Congratulations to our winners.

Coming up events in April are: Club Red Point on the 8th, Club Restricted Pairs (0-100MP) on the 11th and Club Mixed Pairs Championship on the 28th.

We would like to encourage more members to attend the Saturday afternoon sessions. A walk-in policy has been introduced with no stand-by members required. The walk-in member(s) takes a chance whether the person(s) gets to play.

It is pleasing to note that our latest Wednesday morning "learning" session attracted 11 pairs. These sessions (catering for novice and intermediate players) covers topics like 2 Clubs Game Force Openings, Weak 2 Openings, Notrump Openings, Responses to Bids and Card Play Tips. I would like to encourage the newer players to attend.

The next set of Bridge lessons for beginners will commence on Tuesday May 9th at 9am Do encourage your friends to take up Bridge.

Slow Play

Slow play can be a serious problem for both Directors and players alike. Some players may have an excuse due to age or infirmity. Also sometimes those who are new to the game have difficulty keeping to time because of the complex nature of Bridge. Allowances are generally made for those players.

The problem arises when players consistently use up more than their share of the clock. At the beginning of a session or an event there is a stated time for each round. Most clubs have a two or three minute warning on the clock to signal the approach of the end of the round.

It is very important that if people are late coming to your table or if you are following a slow pair that you advise the Director. Most of our Directors keep a close watch on the room but they cannot possibly be aware of everything.

If players take an unfair amount of time to bid, play or defend their hands and you feel short-changed you do have recourse. The Director can warn the pair and also potentially penalize the pair if they continue to eat up too much of the clock. The penalty may consist of a number of matchpoints or victory points being deducted from their score. Also, a reduced or increased percentage can be allocated at the Director's discretion.

At a recent club session a pair notorious for 'slow play' arrived at my table two minutes late only to continue to discuss their previous board. When they finally decided to play the current round they used up another eight minutes for the first board. Leaving us only 3 minutes to bid and play the second hand. Obviously this was not fair.

Once at a national event we were allotted 19 minutes for 2 boards. The opponents took 18 minutes to bid and play the first board. We called the Director and explained the situation. We were told not to play the second board and we were given an average plus. The offending slow players were given an average minus for the second board.

Occasionally I have seen those who have no concept of their slowness. After being warned several times and or perhaps even penalized one would expect that they would get the message. Occasionally anyone can take extra time on say a particularly difficult board. Having said that, you really should be aware if you are habitually slow.

Players should be thinking when playing versus rushing through the bidding and play. If others have taken up too much time on the clock the following boards are often a rushed affair.

What can we do? Firstly, call the Director if you think you are a 'victim of slow play'.

Next if you are a guilty party be aware and try do everything you can to remedy the situation.

Some of the following suggestions may help:

- Sort and count your cards without undue fuss.
- While you are waiting for the auction to begin plan your bidding.
- When the auction is over and you are on lead select your lead and place it face down before making notes on your personal scorer.
- When declaring plan the hand carefully and where possible make a clear and concise claim.
- Claiming is a great time saver.
- Avoid asking questions if you have no intention of bidding. Interrupting the auction is a great time waster and can be potentially unethical. Wait until the end of the auction and ask for a complete review.
- If you are new to the game opt for an East/West position as the burden of scoring which takes time is on someone else.

Above all avoid unnecessary chatter and discussion. If you have been labelled a 'slow player' then save your socializing and post mortems for after the session.

To ensure that we have a level playing field be certain to notify the Director if your opponents have held you up unduly.

Also be aware if you are guilty of slow play and do what you can to rectify the situation.

Slow play can never be obliterated but we can all do our best to try diminish it so that all share the time allotted equitably.

¹ Competitors meet one-to-one in each round and are paired using a predetermined set of rules designed to ensure that each competitor plays opponents with a similar running score, but not the same opponent more than once. The winner is the competitor with the highest aggregate points earned in all rounds.

² Butlers Pairs are scored in International Match Points (IMP)s. These are awarded on a sliding scale which depends on how far away your score is from the average for the room. Tactics for a good score are quite different than the usual Matchpoint scoring

- 1st July prior to the event (if held in second half of the year)



Jack Oswald



Jack came to Australia in 1984 from the UK, where he had lived and worked most of his life with several overseas secondments to make his and his wife, Yvonne's life interesting! His daughter, Jacqueline, moved to Australia in 1985 and after many visits Jack and Yvonne decided to set up house in Perth. Jack retired from Crown Agents in 1990 by


which time they had a home in East Fremantle from where he ran his own home business. AUSTEC.

Jack was a Marine Engineer by profession and did voluntary work with AESOP which was run by the Australian Government and only after this did he fully retire in 2002.

Jack was always a Bridge player but retirement gave him more time to hone his skills and finally he became a Director for Bridge sessions. He loved the game when he wasn't losing and put his hand up to be Treasurer when needed.

Jack died of complications from a stroke in December 2003. He was survived by his wife, Yvonne, and his children, Mark and Brian and Jacqueline.

Bob Simpson



Came to Australia in 1971 and joined Melville Bridge Club shortly thereafter when it still had a room at Tompkins Park.

He was one of the main instigators in getting the present club rooms financed and built, and also designed the airconditioning system in the club (being an airconditioning engineer). He was certainly a well known, dominant,

"leading light" in the club, being forever on the Committee in one capacity or another, including President. He was awarded Life Membership of the Club.

[He was always a controversial figure! And he hated becoming a smoking pariah!! That the club had to adjust its smoking ways!!]

But Bridge was his passion and his life!

When he died in 1994, his sister Yvonne in the States donated a trophy in his memory to be awarded to an outstanding contributor to the club during the year.

Harold Lander



Harold Bernard Lander was born on 22^{nd} August 1919 and died on 16^{th} June 1994.

His mother and brothers were keen bridge players and they had sessions at least twice a week in the Southern River Hall in Gosnells in the 1950's.
