Older and Smarter

What happens to our cognitive abilities as we age? If your think our brains go into a steady decline, recent research published in the *Journal Topics in Cognitive Science* may make you think again.

The work, headed by Dr. Michael Ramscar of Tübingen University, Germany, took a critical look at the measures usually thought to show that our cognitive abilities decline across adulthood. Instead of finding evidence of decline, the team discovered that most standard cognitive measures, which date back to the early twentieth century, are flawed.

"The human brain works slower in old age," says Ramscar, "but only because we have stored more information over time."

Studies have lead scientists to now believe people do not decline mentally with age – it just takes them longer to recall facts because they have more information stored. It has been suggested that much like a computer struggles as the hard drive becomes full, so humans also take longer to access information as they retain more information.

The Tübingen research concluded that we need different tests for the cognitive abilities of older people – taking into account the nature and amount of information our brains process.

"The brains of older people do not get weak," says Dr Michael Ramscar. "On the contrary, they simply know more."
